

Shaping a valuable Smart Readiness Indicator (SRI) for buildings

Contribution to SRI Topical Groups A & B

smartEn – Smart Energy Europe supports the ongoing efforts of the new SRI consortium to define a valuable Smart Readiness Indicator (SRI) for buildings, to be deployed across Europe.

We appreciate the working method that allows stakeholders to share opinions and suggestions on how to fine-tune the SRI. Beyond the verbal remarks already outlined during the conference calls of both Topical Groups A and B, smartEn would like to provide the following written inputs:

- The SRI should inform facility managers/owners/occupants about the smart services that
 are currently present in their buildings and also the potential smart services that could be
 added.
 - The degree of complexity of information provided should depend on the SRI assessment type:
 - "Method A" should simply raise awareness among owners/occupants of existing residential and small non-residential buildings. It should be carried out through a self-assessment that should reflect all 3 functionalities set out in the EPBD review: the readiness for demand-side flexible should be clearly assessed through Method
 - In order to ease such self-assessment, households should be able to compare their buildings with a reference case, to realize and determine in a simple way how similar/dissimilar their building is in comparison to an ideal smart and active building.
 - "Method B" should involve a third-party assessor to define:
 - an SRI certificate that signals both a single score for the building and individual impact scores that this is built upon;
 - an SRI report to complement the certificate and provide insights to building owners on how to upgrade the smartness of their building with specific investment recommendations.
 - Both of them should be integrated into a new, effective, and comprehensive certification for buildings, tied with financial/fiscal incentives and fully integrated into energy and climate policies driving EU climate neutrality.
- A Steering Committee is needed to update the SRI framework every year to ensure product innovations are included in the catalogue of services and methodology.
 - A subgroup of this Committee should be tasked to investigate how to move towards Method C, i.e. move the SRI towards a quantitative building performance indicator.
